## MD 105 CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

Fellow Lions will recall that there was discussion earlier this year about the possibility of the Multiple District employing a Chief Executive Officer. The following letter on the subject from the Chairman of Council was received just too late to be published in our November issue.

Fellow Lions

### Your Council of Governors has decided not to take this step.

Contrary to the belief of some members, previous Councils had taken no decision on this matter and anxious to clarify the situation as quickly as possible, the new Council of Governors appointed a sub-committee at its first Council meeting in July to consider the requirements and the way forward in the possible appointment of a CEO or executive officer for our Multiple District. Its mandate was to investigate the whole situation, reporting to the October Council meeting on the way ahead.

Having investigated every aspect of the proposed appointment from the original documentation to the present day, they found that considerable changes have taken place since the idea was first floated four years ago. With improved line management plus new equipment and subsequent improved ability of the MDHQ staff and the fact that one of the existing part time staff has expressed her intention to retire in the Spring of 2007, a complete review was made. Over a period of 6 weeks including two full day meetings and taking information from numerous sources including membership performance data from similar Multiple Districts in Europe, the committee was unanimous in its report and its recommendations to Council.

They recommended that the Council of Governors should advise the MDHQ management panel that in place of the retiring part time staff member, a new

full time staff member should be sought, with strong IT skills and future management potential, to strengthen the existing salaried staff and that **the appointment of a CEO or senior executive officer should no longer be considered.** The existing senior staff member would retain her current status and position. **This will have no financial impact on members per capita dues.**

Your Council of Governors approved this decision by a large majority vote. Hopefully this will settle the uncertainty, disquiet and unease, which has been obvious in recent months and will enable us to concentrate on the important factors of Lionism, providing vital services for our World. We are the largest Voluntary Service Club Organisation in the World, and long may we remain so.

One of the important areas, which had been envisaged for the executive officer to tackle had been Membership growth, so now fellow lions it is still up to you. **The only effective way to gain new members and keep them is to make your own club even more successful and an organisation that other men and women want to join. Only you can do that.** Let us now have a bumper year and go forth and multiply.

## MINUTES OF THE LAST ZONE MEETING

### 1. Welcome and Introductions

ZC Pete welcomed Tony Thorn from Sussex Air Ambulance and Region Chairman John Wilkinson, plus all in attendance to the second zone meeting of the 2006/07 Lions year. Introductions from all present were made allowing everyone to put names to faces etc.

### 2. Apologies for absence

Received from Keith Austen (Sec, Lewes), Clem Collins (President, NP&S) Bill Hurren (President Adur East), Sam Marshall (Sec, Hove) and Dave Walker (Sec, R&S).

### 3. Minutes of the previous meeting on Tue 15<sup>th</sup> August 2006

Were signed by ZC Pete as a true record of the previous meeting.

### 4. Matters Arising

**(5f and 5i):** ZC Pete thanked those clubs who have so far provided names for the positions of Vulnerable Persons and Club Welfare Officers. Both sets of names have been passed to the District Officers that requested this information. Will other clubs please let the ZC know as and when they are able to appoint one of the above roles.

### 5. Zone Chairman's Report and Cabinet Meeting feedback

a. The 105SE costume theme for the Friday Host Night at the MD Convention (to be held in Torquay in May 2007), is to be "Pook's Pirates", to go with the Caribbean theme of the evening

b. Message In A Bottle: There is currently an embargo on supplies from the District. While this is being sort out, clubs should contact MD for any supplies of the bottles.

c. Shoebox 2006: PDG David Richards informed cabinet that this year only 7 clubs provided donations towards the transport costs, which has meant digging into reserves. Consideration to the declining number of clubs supporting the costs will need to be taken into account when considering the next shoebox appeal. If any club would like to make a donation, please send your cheque to PDG Dave Richards and not District Treasurer Nigel Morris

d. The Boston Cows: The US are running a PR project using "plastic" cows to advertise Lions awareness and it has been **mooted** (no pun intended) that 105SE might make use of a similar idea. The District PRO has been tasked with investigating costs etc. There was some discussion on worries regarding vandalism and that if supported the animals should be Lions rather than cows. ZC will be looking for more moos (sorry news..) at the next Cabinet meeting and will provide feedback at the next zone meeting

e. MD Convention: The Long Range Planning Group are looking for feedback on the possibility of changing the duration of the MD Convention to one day. Proposal also being considered by MD regarding the possibility of re-districting. The likely proposal would be to move some northerly parts of stronger districts into other less thriving districts. (This is not likely to affect clubs in this zone as we are the most southerly). If you have any views, please let the ZC know

f. Transporting Young Children: Clubs were reminded about the recently introduced legislation regarding the transport of young children in vehicles and the requirement to provide a special car seat. The MD Health & Safety Officer is preparing a guidance document

g. District Convention in Hove: Cabinet wished to express their thanks to Hove Lions and Zone 2A for all your hard work so far – you are doing a grand job!

h. District Music Competition: There are no entries from this district so far. Will clubs look to see if they can put an entry together

i. Vulnerable Persons Officer: District Officer Phil Robinson is producing a template to be used for preparation of a Risk Assessment – contact Phil for details. Phil Robinson mentioned that due to new legislation coming in it may be necessary for webmasters to be CRB checked, particularly where chatrooms or message boards are used.

j. Public Relations: (i) Posters for promotional purposes are available for download from the MD website. (ii) If any clubs need to be assigned with an 0845 number, please contact PDG Bill Blake

k. Young Ambassador: The ZC enquired whether any clubs are planning to become involved with this year's Young Ambassador project (note by 1<sup>st</sup> November!) – clubs are encouraged to consider this as a project.

l. ZC introduced the Lions Door Hanger for use by disabled, deaf or blind people in hotels, guest houses and B&Bs. The hanger goes on the door, so that in the event of a fire, the authorities would know that this person required help. Stocks will be obtained by ZC Pete and distributed to clubs.

m. Deaf Awareness: A leaflet has been produced providing guidance for business people in dealing with deaf people.

n. Used Hearing Aids: Any clubs willing to make a donation towards the cost of batteries for these items should contact District Hearing officer Mike Medlen,.

o. Go-kart Competition (Battle & District): Will clubs please consider entering or sponsoring an entry for this competition next year. Lion Glyn Upjohn or Battle & District Lions will be able to provide details and reminds clubs that all proceeds are given to LIBRA

p. A new booklet related to the LIBRA "Acorns to Oaks" project has been produced

q. Shoebox 2007: Various locations being considered, but initial indications are that next year's appeal will probably be to return to Gomel.

r. Spikeys: ZC introduced information of a possible SE Project about a new gadget called a spikey, which is designed to be inserted into a bottle and thereby preventing the drink from being "spiked". Lion Jackie Blake has been asked to obtain further information and report back at the next Cabinet meeting.

h. **Adur East:** At the club's recent Cheese & Wine evening, £1000 was donated to a local mental health hospice. The club's Zone Social will be at Corals Greyhound stadium on 8<sup>th</sup> March 2007 – details to follow. The club will be starting their annual cake stall sales at Southlands Hospital each Thursday up to Christmas from 16<sup>th</sup> November.

## AND FINALLY . . .

The recent announcement that Donner and Blitzen have elected to take the early reindeer retirement package has triggered a good deal of concern about whether they will be replaced, and about other restructuring decisions at the North Pole.

Streamlining is due to the North Pole's loss of dominance in the season's gift distribution business. The Internet, home shopping TV channels and mail order catalogues have diminished Santa's market share. He and the Board could not sit idly by and permit further erosion of the profit picture.

The reindeer downsizing was made possible through purchase of a late model Japanese sledge for the CEO's annual trip. Improved productivity from Dasher and Dancer, who summered at the Harvard Business School, is anticipated. Reduction in the reindeer will also lessen airborne environmental emissions for which the North Pole has received unfavourable press (gas and solid waste).

As for further restructuring, today's global challenges require the North Pole to continue to look for better, more

competitive steps. Effective immediately, the following economy measures are to take place in the "Twelve Days of Christmas" music subsidiary:

1) The partridge will be retained, but the pear tree, which never produced the forecast cash crop, will be replaced by a plastic hanging plant, providing considerable savings in maintenance;

2) Two turtle doves represent a redundancy that is simply not cost effective. In addition, their romance during working hours could not be condoned. The positions are, therefore, eliminated;

3) The three French hens will remain intact. After all, everyone loves the French;

4) The four calling birds will be replaced by an automated voice mail system, with a call waiting option. An analysis is underway to determine who the birds have been calling, how often and how long they talked;

5) The five golden rings have been put on hold by the Board of Directors. Maintaining a portfolio based on one commodity could have negative implications for institutional investors. Diversification into other precious metals, as well as a mix of gilts and high technology stocks, appears to be in order;

6) The six geese-a-laying constitutes a luxury which can no longer be afforded. It has long been felt that the production rate of one egg per goose per day was an example of the general decline in productivity. Three geese will be let go, and an upgrading in the selection procedure by personnel will assure management that, from now on, every goose it gets will be a good one;

7) The seven swans-a-swimming is obviously a number chosen in better times. The function is primarily decorative. Mechanical swans are on order. The current swans will be retrained to learn some new strokes, thereby enhancing their outplacement;

8) As you know, the eight maids-a-milking concept has been under heavy scrutiny by the EU. A male/female balance in the workforce is being sought. The more militant maids consider this a dead-end job with no upward mobility. Automation of the process may permit the maids to try a-mending, a-mentoring or a-mulching;

9) Nine ladies dancing has always been an odd number. This function will be phased out as these individuals grow older and can no longer do the steps;

10) Ten Lords-a-leaping is overkill. The high cost of Lords, plus the

expense of international air travel, prompted the Compensation Committee to suggest replacing this group with ten out-of-work Cabinet ministers. While leaping ability may be somewhat sacrificed, the savings are significant as we expect an oversupply of unemployed Cabinet ministers this year;

11) Eleven pipers piping and twelve drummers drumming is a simple case of the band getting too big. A substitution with a string quartet, a cutback on new music, and no uniforms, will produce savings which will drop right to the bottom line;

Overall we can expect a substantial reduction in assorted people, fowl, animals and related expenses. Though incomplete, studies indicate that stretching deliveries over twelve days is inefficient. If we can drop ship in one day, service levels will be improved.

Regarding the lawsuit filed by the attorney's association seeking expansion to include the legal profession ("thirteen lawyers-a-suing"), a decision is pending.

Deeper cuts may be necessary in the future to remain competitive. Should that happen, the Board will request management to scrutinize the Snow White Division to see if seven dwarfs is the right number.
